Welcome to the first edition of Renal News our new bulletin about your renal dialysis service. There is currently a lot going on in our haemodialysis programme and through this

monthly newsletter we'll be keeping you up-to-date with all the changes and how you can get more information about the moves. We will also be including a range of information for haemodialysis patients such as how to get involved in research.

As you will know, Diaverum have been appointed to run four new units in Tipton, Aston, Kings Norton and Hereford, which

will be opening in November. The City unit will continue as it is for a few more months but will move to a new unit in Smethwick next summer (2015), run by UHB.

For those of you in Woodgate, Worcester, Sparkhill, Kidderminster and Llandrindod Wells there is no change at the moment for you but we hope you will find this information interesting.

We know this is going to be a busy time which can be unsettling, therefore we'll be working hard behind the scenes to ensure that the transition will be as smooth as possible, but please do contact us if you have concerns or questions.

Units scoop awards

Three of the dialysis units in the West Midlands have been recognised for the quality of their care. Sparkhill and Woodgate Valley have received Fresenius Medical Care's (FMC) gold award for their clinical outcomes after being consistently ranked amongst the top five performing FMC units in the country for eight months. The Tipton unit received the bronze medal after 4 months top 5 out of the 50 FMC dialysis units.

Work on new Tipton unit begins

Construction work on a new dialysis unit for Tipton is underway. Building began on 1 April and is expected to take five months to complete the unit.

The purpose-built unit, which will be situated on George Henry Way in Great Bridge (DY4 7BU), is the first of four units to be built by Diaverum and is designed to offer modern, comfortable surroundings with maximum light and space.

The unit will have 20 dialysis stations, 4 isolation rooms and 2 consulting rooms as well as meeting rooms and staff facilities.

Kim Beak, Project Manager for Diaverum said: "We are really excited at the prospect of building a new unit from scratch to provide a clean, safe, comfortable environment which better meets the needs of our patients.

"It is a great opportunity for patients and staff to benefit from brand new equipment and facilities and to further improve patient care."



Location, location, location

Finding the right locations for new dialysis units has been a top priority for the team and much consideration has been given to making the sites as accessible as possible.

We understand that travelling to and from dialysis sessions can be a source of anxiety for some patients therefore, in order to minimise travel disruptions, the proposed locations for the new units have been carefully planned to be as close to the existing units as possible - a number of the units are even on the same street.

At this stage, the proposed locations are subject to planning consent, therefore there is always the possibility that these may need to change. We hope to show you these in the next edition.



We understand that changing where you dialyse is a little concerning but we have worked hard with Diaverum to find properties that will be suitable for dialysis units as close as possible to your current unit. The designs look great and as soon as we have more to show you, we will do just that.

Improving patient facilities

In order to enhance the dialysis service, you may remember we carried out a survey just over a year ago when we asked patients what additional facilities would improve patient experience. Around half of patients told us they wanted better Internet access and 85 percent of patients said they wanted individual TVs to help pass the time while dialysing.

Taking the feedback on board, the new units will offer a range of facilities making the environment as comfortable as possible and patients will benefit from:

- **✓** Parking
- ▼ TV units for each bed space
- ✓ Internet access
- More space between stations
- New equipment / machinery





We have spent a lot of time looking into what size of unit is best for patient care. We feel that units with 20-24 stations are the optimum size. This allows the unit manager to get to know patients individually, address any issues promptly and better manage patient care. The new units at Tipton, Aston and Smethwick will all have 20 stations and Diaverum will continue to run twilight shifts.

Improving dialysis through research

Improvements in dialysis happen in a variety of different ways but changes can only be helpful to the wider dialysis population if we know that they are both safe and improve people's lives. This is where research comes into the picture. Research is simply a method of making changes in a systematic and controlled way and then observing the results. Sometimes all it involves is collecting a little extra data

about a person however, when the results are analysed, we can understand whether the change may be useful and safe for all patients who dialyse.

There is a growing level of interest in carrying out research with haemodialysis patients and as UHB has one of the largest and most diverse patient groups in the UK, we are ideally placed to lead in this field.

At any one time, we have several research studies running aimed at helping us to provide better care for our patients. For

example, we are currently running studies looking at how much iron to give patients, low mood or depression in patients who dialyse and a new treatment that may help fistulas work better and last longer. One study that is coming to a close has examined how best to treat a cancer that causes kidney problems.

Improvements in care through research rely on people who are willing to take part in studies. Over the coming months, we will explain the different ways research is carried out and what it means for patients taking part in a study. We are keen that we can find ways of designing studies which cause the least disruption to your everyday lives, but still gather the high-quality data we need.

We are also keen to get ideas from anyone who dialyses because we want to study subjects that matter to you. In the next newsletter we will be explaining how



to get involved and be part of this exciting drive to improve the care and quality of lives of people who dialyse.

In the mean time, if you are approached to take part in a study, please take the time to read the information given to you about the research and the staff involved. Taking part is always voluntary and we are always happy talk to you and answer any questions you may have.
